

Accuses Benny Lee of Trying To Hide Anti-Business Stance

□ The Times' article, "*(Benny) Lee Runs for Council in District 4,*" (Page one, Sept. 6) stated: "He now says he does not want to share his personal opinion on the (proposed Halus Power Systems) turbine..."

□ Mr. Lee has apparently concluded that it would be bad for his campaign for voters to know that he is aggressively trying to force a green small business to leave San Leandro – taking with it the 10 existing jobs and the potential for many more. Or to know that he personally and as President of the Heron Bay Homeowners Association submitted letters (available at City Hall) unequivocally opposing the project.

□ Mr. Lee is trying to keep his anti-business activities a secret – saying one thing and doing the opposite. The voters need to know the facts!

□ Halus Power Systems is the kind of business we should fight to keep in San Leandro – green technology, R&D and manufacturing. Halus recycles, re-engineers and repurposes wind

turbines. Halus, in partnership with the prestigious Sandia Labs, needs the turbine to conduct important research – research that can result in significant energy efficiencies for alternative power.

□ This is the kind of business every community wants, and Mr. Lee, in opposing it, is out of touch and out of line.

□ San Leandro has a great opportunity to attract new investment and new companies in the coming years. But Benny Lee’s “secret” efforts to force Halus Power Systems to leave San Leandro based upon his personal opinions and unsubstantiated fears will undermine that opportunity.

□ Now is the time for San Leandro to welcome new businesses and promote existing businesses. Now is *not* the time for politicians to say one thing and hope you don’t know that they are doing another.

Hopes San Leandro Will Invest More in Its Schools

□ As a parent of two children in San Leandro Public Schools, I was surprised to read the claim that Castro Valley's "cost per student is significantly lower than San Leandro's." According to the sources cited by Mr. Banks (*Letters, Aug. 30*), Castro Valley actually spends over \$3000 more per student per year compared to San Leandro.

□ Data from the Calif. Department of Education shows recent budget data for all districts on the website ed-data.k12.ca.us. San Leandro spent \$7,796 per student while Castro Valley spent \$10,963.

□ In fact, San Leandro spends the least per student among all districts in Alameda County and places far below the state average of \$9100 per student.

□ CDE also reports that while most funding for districts comes from state and federal sources, Castro Valley makes a local contribution of \$166 per student, while San Leandro only provides a local contribution of \$32 per student, also the lowest in Alameda County.

□ I've been impressed with San Leandro's ability to stretch every dollar to help meet the needs of all students, including our English learners (we have three times as many as Castro Valley,

and our students qualifying for free and reduced price lunch), but dismayed to see the impacts of deferred maintenance, increased class sizes, lack of materials and high teacher turnover.

□ I do agree with Mr. Banks assertion that Castro Valley is getting an excellent return on their investment and hope that San Leandro is willing to make similar investments in our schools and our children.
