□ If San Leandro Hospital is to remain open as an acute care facility with both inpatient and emergency services, it will require the help of everybody in the community.

□ Largely because of the Eden Township Healthcare District (ETHD), the Hospital remains open today offering these services but the future is uncertain. ETHD no longer owns the Hospital, Sutter Health does but they have indicated they would consider allowing the Hospital to continue its current mission under the direction of the Alameda County Medical Center (ACMC) along with assistance from the City of San Leandro and ETHD.

□ Recent meetings of these three entities have all resulted in a willingness to provide needed funding since the Hospital loses millions of dollars a year.

□ A recent study in San Leandro supports utilizing a parcel tax to help and additional funding can come from Alameda County and the Federal Government. But you, the San Leandro resident can also help. When your doctor recommends a procedure, lab work, xray or other test be done, try to utilize the services at San Leandro Hospital.

□ A lot of the problem is patients seek these elective services other places, leaving San Leandro to care for the under and uninsured which lowers their reimbursement and hurting their bottom line.

□ Not only does San Leandro Hospital save lives, but it also is a valuable employer. Working together as a community, we can all pitch in and hopefully save this valuable community resource.

□ Aging is never easy, but if frequent shortness of breath, wheezing and excessive phlegm are becoming consistent problems, you may be facing a much more serious problem.

□ Chronic Obstruction Pulmonary Disease, or COPD, affects more than 24 million Americans, and yet half go about their daily lives unaware of the condition. The ailment's pervasive nature, combined with an alarming lack of awareness, has made COPD and other chronic respiratory diseases the third-leading cause of death in the United States.

□ Luckily, with early diagnosis and treatment, people suffering from COPD can improve their symptoms and regain a sense of normalcy in their lives.

□ November is COPD Awareness Month, and partners such as the California Medical Association Foundation (CMA) and the National Heart, Lung, and Blood Institute are asking citizens to take the first steps in fighting this disease by learning more about COPD.

□ If you are experiencing any of the symptoms mentioned above, talk to your physician and ask for a simple breathing test called spirometry.

□ This month, don't let a serious condition such as COPD slide by unnoticed. Visit the CMA Foundation website, to see how you can help spread awareness of this terrible disease.
